

Securus Security Software on our School Network

Dear Parent

We take your child's safety on the internet very seriously. To this end, we are writing to you to bring you up to date with a new software system that we have installed.

Securus Education is a software system which helps us to ensure that our computer network is being used safely. It is used by over 3,200 schools in the UK and many more internationally. Securus also acts as an educational tool, helping children to recognise unsafe situations and encouraging them to use new technologies responsibly.

Securus alerts staff to any words on our network that would lead us to believe that our very high standards of safeguarding, reflected in our Acceptable Use Policy, might be being jeopardised. Securus is effective both online and offline across all programmes used by the school.

Incidents flagged by Securus would include any evidence of bullying, inappropriate language, indicators of emotional distress, searches for harmful websites and so on.

A screen 'capture' is taken of every incident, showing what was displayed at the time, who was involved and when the incident took place. These captures enable staff to respond to potentially serious or disruptive situations with confidence.

The immediacy of this system can help prevent issues from spiralling into something more serious.

We are conscious that the world online can be a very dangerous place so we want to assure you that we have given serious thought to making sure your child's online experiences are safe.

We would like to take the opportunity to thank you for your continued co-operation in this very important area.

P3 – Overview of planned work for October

Numeracy: Number work will focus on subtraction up to 20/finding the difference between numbers /doubles of numbers to 20. Missing number box sums. Consolidation of number bonds- related to weekly table tests. Counting in 2s, 5s, 10s to 50 or 100. Using the 100 grid to quickly add 10 and 9. Introduction of the place value of numbers to 99.

Topic work: Measures- length using cm and metres/ weight/ data handling. Times- o'clock, half past and corresponding digital times.

Literacy: This month children will be looking at books by the Author-Julia Donaldson: e.g., The Gruffalo, Monkey Puzzle etc. Focus will be on 'Room on the Broom' where they will carry out book reviews, character profiles and recounts. They will also be introduced to the genre of report writing. Topic/World Around Us: Finishing off work on ourselves /senses. Looking at teeth - how to care for them, types of teeth and tasting. Seasonal change -Autumn, Halloween and its traditions.

Other Information: P3 will visit Florencecourt House on the 20th or 24th of October for the Halloween Ball. (This is mainly art/craft activities associated with Halloween.) More information to follow. Each class will also attend mass this term as part of our religious programme - Mrs Reihill class - 25th October

P4 - Overview of planned work for October

Literacy: Pupils will know that adjectives are describing words used to tell us more about nouns - colour, shape, size, number, looks, smells, tastes, feels, sounds. Pupils will know that we use capital letters for CHIPS - **C**alendar words- months, days, **H**olidays- Christmas, Easter, **I**- When using I as a pronoun, **P**roper nouns- People, Places, Pets, **S** - Beginning of a sentence. Pupils will continue to learn their spellings using the LSCWC (Look, Say, Cover Write, Check) method and will complete various activities to reinforce the spelling rule. Pupils will be reading their class novel, 'Little Manfred' and will be carrying out activities based on this. In writing pupils will be learning about the features of letters and will be writing their own letters pretending to be evacuees.

Numeracy: Pupils will learn their number bonds to 20. They will know how to add doubles and near doubles up to 20. Pupils will know how to add 9 and 11 to numbers mentally. They will add using number lines and partitioning to add 2 digit numbers. Pupils will begin to add using column addition. Pupils will recognise odd and even numbers. In topic work pupils will know how to use a ruler. They will recognise the standard units of measurement e.g. cm, km. Pupils will know how to read a calendar. They will name the 12 months and 4 seasons. Pupils will learn how many days are in each month.

World Around Us: Pupils will be learning all about rationing and what daily life was like for children in WW2. Pupils will know the difference between translucent, transparent and opaque. Pupils will design and carry out an experiment to find out which materials makes the best parachute. Pupils will investigate the forces of flight. In art pupils will be learning about the work of Henry Moore and they will be creating a picture using charcoal. They will be using pastels to make their own version of Van Gogh's 'The Road to Tarascon'.

P5 - Overview of Planned work for October

Numeracy: Addition and subtraction of Hundreds, Tens and Units, problem solving activities (Introduce Izak 9, table top games and worksheets). Topic - Properties of 2D (square, triangle, rectangle, circle) & 3D shapes (cube, cuboid, cylinder, sphere, cone), symmetry (mirror images), lines (horizontal, vertical, diagonal and parallel). Mental Maths - Subtracting tables. Weekly tables test preparation. Encourage use of everyday maths e.g. shapes, time and money to enable children to see maths in day to day context.

Literacy: Novel: Charlotte's Web and related activities. Grammar work – Adjectives (describing words) and Adverbs (describing a verb). We will complete Schofield & Sims Spelling Programme and prepare the children for their test. Writing – Poetry (link with Minibeast topic and Halloween) and acrostic poems.

World Around Us: Continued topic work on Minibeasts. Finish work on insects and carry out activities on the spider. Minibeast hunt

Other Information:

- Sign diary or homework every night when checking homework activities
- 10 minutes Mathletics tasks every night
- 10 minutes Accelerated Reading every night
- Bring instrument to school every Wednesday (Keep safe at home please)
- Highlight important information or signs in Mental Arithmetic work

P6 - Overview of Planned work for October

Numeracy: Pupils will be able to - Add with 4,5,6 digit numbers using standard written method. Subtract with and without decomposition (carrying a ten). Subtract whole numbers using a range of mental, written and calculator methods. Solve problems involving addition and subtraction. (Maths Games/Izak 9). Use the relationship between addition and subtraction to check calculations. Understand and underline the key words when solving problems using addition and subtraction. (esp. in Mental Arithmetic books)

Topic: 2D shapes. Pupils will understand terms of line- horizontal, vertical, diagonal, parallel and perpendicular. Pupils will know language associated with measuring a circle. They will be able to find the diameter, circumference and radius

Literacy: Children will know and recognise verbs. They will be able to add ed, ied, es, ies and ing properly. Children will be able to form verbs in the past, present and future tense. The children will write a variety of story openings. They will understand story structure to plan and write a story, drawing on personal experiences. [narrative]. Novel – the children will listen to and respond to our class novel, "George's secret key to the Universe."

Topic/World Around Us: Pupils will learn how shadows are formed and changed. Know the earth travels around the sun and it takes a year to orbit the sun. Know that the earth's surface spins into the sun's light we have daylight and when it spins away from the sun's light we have darkness.

Other Information:

We encourage the P6's to keep AR reading and Mathletics activities going alongside their daily homework. Each pupil should be taking at least one AR test per week (unless very long book) and working through their Mathletics tasks (as set by the teacher). These should correspond with what they are doing in class.

- AR Books can be changed in the library on a Tuesday & Friday between 8.15 and 8.50.
- ICT suite is also available at these times to complete AR tests.

P7 - Overview of planned work for October

Numeracy: This month we will be covering fractions, simplifying, equivalent, proper, improper and ordering fractions. We will look at the relationship between common fractions, decimals and percentages. We will calculate fractions and percentages of quantities, including money. We will study acute, obtuse reflex and right angles and estimate, measure, draw and label angels up to 360 degrees. Learn multiples and factors. We will look at prime, squared, cubed and triangular numbers. We will use and express formulae in words and in symbolic form. Revision of tables 1-12.

Literacy: Pupils will continue to read the novel 'Twist of Gold' by Michael Morpurgo and complete associated activities. Children will complete grammar work on tenses, comma, capital letters, direct and indirect speech, proof reading exercises, homophones, similes, metaphors, prefixes and antonyms. Children will complete a variety of listening and written comprehensions. Children will look at biographies and auto-biographies from a range of people and complete work on these.

World Around Us: The topic this term is the Famine.
