The P1 children really enjoyed having a special visitor in school as part of their celebration of Catholic Schools Week.







Science Experiments

Our preschool children had great fun bringing snow inside for science experiments this week. They also made predictions on what they thought would happen when they placed water outside overnight and saw their results the next day – Ice. Super learning everyone.

P3 overview of planned work - February

Mathematics: Children will continue to count in 1s, 2s, 3s, 4s, 5s and 10s up to 50 /100; they will be familiar with the patterns which occur, eg a quick way to get 16 is by adding 10 and 6 more; doubles and halves of number to 20; word problems relating to addition and subtraction; continue to reinforce addition and subtraction number bonds to 20; addition of T.U. while bridging the 10 and subtraction of T.U.

Topic Work: Fractions (halves and quarters of number) and shapes; data handling relating to recording of weather **Literacy**: We will continue to look at some of the works of Jill Tomlinson, our class novel is her book 'The Penguin who wanted to find out'. Our writing genre for this month is procedural writing. This will be related to our W.A.U. topics of weather (eg: how to make a windmill). Topical poetry related to weather and a study of the poem "The Owl and the Pussy Cat' with related literacy lessons. Grammar focus is identifying verbs and adding ing /ed **The World Around Us**: We will continue our weather theme looking at ways to gather information and record the data (linked to numeracy); we will look at the map of Ireland and locate places of interest eg: Belfast, Dublin & Enniskillen. History: Great Science Inventors /the Hot Air Balloon.

Other Information:

- Each class will attend Mass in Saint Michael's church during February.

P4 overview of planned work - February

<u>Literacy-</u> Pupils will know that **alliteration** is the repetition of the same sound or letter at the beginning of each or most of the words in a sentence. They will use alliteration to make up newspaper article titles. Pupils will know what question words are and will look at when we use question marks. Pupils will continue to learn their spellings using the LSCWC method and will complete various activities to reinforce the spelling rule. Pupils will be reading their class novel, 'Flat Stanley and the Great Egyptian Grave Robbery' and will be writing a newspaper report based on Stanley's adventure.

<u>Numeracy-</u> Pupils will be learning about subtraction and will be solving word problems. They will continue to learn multiplication facts. Our topic work this month will cover 2D shape where children will name 2D shapes and identify their properties. Pupils will know how to find the area of rectangles and squares. We will also be continually revising the times of o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to, days of the week and months of the year.

<u>World Around Us-</u> Our topic this term will be Ancient Egypt. We will be researching Ancient Egypt to help us complete powerpoints in ICT. Pupils will be learning about the skeleton and the major organs of the body. They will be creating a holiday brochure for Egypt. Pupils will know how society was organised in Ancient Egypt and they will be learning all about Tutankhamun. In art pupils will make a cartouche using clay.

P5 overview of planned work - February

Numeracy

Number: Consolidation of multiplication work. Start division work. Word problems around the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division)

Topic: Measures (length and weight)

Mental Maths – Multiplying and dividing (weekly tables linked). Estimation of length and weight. Problem solving activities and word problems for division, length and weight. Weekly tables test preparation.

Literacy

Novel: Continue work on 'Kaspar, the Prince of Cats' and related activities from novel booklet.

Grammar work: Apostrophes, possession (showing ownership), contractions (can not = can't,)

Writing/Spelling: Newspaper reports – skimming and scanning for important information. Write own report linked to novel/ world around us topic. P5 will complete 'Schofield & Sims' spelling programme

World Around Us

- Topic work on Titanic cross section of the Titanic, survivors of the Titanic, Morse Code and who was to blame for the sinking of the Titanic
- Independent research at home on the survivors and the music played when the ship was sinking

Other Information – Trips, Visits etc.

- 10 minutes Doodle Maths & Accelerated Reading every night
- Homework diary signed and homework fully completed every night handed in by Thursday
- Highlight important words/symbols in Mental Arithmetic
- Trip to the Titanic Quarter in Belfast (26th February)
- Instrument every Wednesday

P6 overview of planned work - February

Maths

Number: Pupils will know and be able to use division facts. They will be able to divide whole numbers and understand remainders. They will understand the link between multiplication and division.

Topic: Complete Area. Pupils will know there are different types of angles and be able to calculate angles within shape. They will learn how to use a protractor and measure a variety of angles in different shapes.

English: Pupils will be learning how to use apostrophes as contractions and for possession in their writing. Written activities will be linked to report writing.

Topic/World Around Us: Pupils will continue work on our 'Viking' topic looking at Viking long ships and Raids. Children are encouraged to visit their local library and take out books that may be relevant to our topic.

Homework

We encourage the P6 children to keep doing AR quizzes and Doodle Maths which is part of their daily homework. Each pupil should be taking <u>at least</u> one AR test per week (more if on green and orange level) and working towards their word count target for the term. Takeaway homework will continue for P6.

AR Books can be changed in the library between 8.30 and 8.50. The ICT suite is available at these times to complete AR tests.

P7 overview of planned work - February

Literacy

- Persuasive writing- we will be looking at advertisements and writing arguments for and against. Pupils will be expressing their opinions and using emotive and persuasive language.
- "Twelfth Day of July Novel' and related activities.

Numeracy

- Fractions equivalence, comparing and ordering, adding and subtracting.
- Percentages link to fractions, of set and quantity, comparing and ordering.
- Time 12 and 24 hr clock, timetables, calendars, durations and world times.

Dublin Trip: Could outstanding money for this year's trip to Dublin be paid by the end of March, thank you.





Miss School Miss Out - Attendance

Holy Trinity regard excellent attendance in school as vitally important in allowing a child to fulfil their potential. Children need to attend school to learn, to make good friends, to experience new things in life and to build confidence and self-esteem. Children who regularly miss school without good reason are more likely to become isolated from their friends, to underachieve and/or become involved in ant-social behaviour. A habit formed now of poor attendance can be very difficult to change in adolescence.

EVERY SCHOOL DAY COUNTS

Every single day a child is absent from school equates to a day of lost learning.

100% Attendance	O Days Missed
95% Attendance	9 Days of Absence 1 Week and 4 Days of Learning Missed
90% Attendance	19 Days of Absence 3 Weeks and 4 Days of Learning Missed
85% Attendance	28 Days of Absence 5 Weeks and 3 Days of Learning Missed

HOW PARENTS CAN HELP

- Establish a good routine in the mornings and evenings so your child is prepared for the school day ahead.
- Make sure your child goes to school regularly and follows the school rules.
- Ensure your child arrives at school on time not late.
- Arrange dental and medical appointments outside school hours when possible.
- Always inform the school if your child is absent due to illness - this should be followed up with a written
- Parents of children aged 4-16 who are enrolled in school are legally required to make sure they attend.

- note when your child returns to school.
- If your child is not attending school as you expect they may be putting themselves at risk - Who are they with? What are they doing?
- Do not take family holidays during term time
- Talk to your child about school and take an interest in their school work (including homeworks).
- Attend parents evenings and school events.
- Praise and reward your child's achievements at school.
- Always support school staff in their efforts to control difficult or challenging behaviour.
