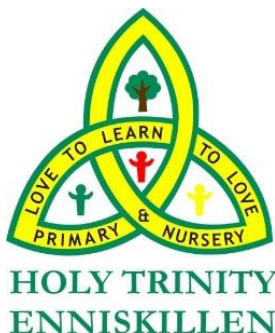

Holy Trinity receive a second Eco flag

On Tuesday 26th February two Eco Schools Assessors visited Holy Trinity to carry out the Eco Schools assessment. During their visit they spoke to the Eco Councils on Mill street and on Cornagrade. They talked about how the Eco council helps our school environment, how we keep ourselves healthy and how we try to reduce the schools Carbon Footprint.

A group of pupils from P5 recited poems which they had written about key Eco areas e.g. litter, recycling and the dangers of plastic. This was followed by a PowerPoint presentation from the KS2 Eco Council and a talk with the KS1 Eco Council. The children highlighted the work of the Eco Council in keeping our school tidy and reducing energy use within the school. They talked about our Eco Code and about our work with Sustrans (a UK transport charity which makes it easier for people to walk and cycle to school) to reduce our school's carbon footprint and keep ourselves healthy.

Mrs Gormley, our WAU Co-ordinator, was delighted with the news that we have now received our second Eco Schools' flag. Well done to everyone in the school and especially to Mrs Gormley and the hardworking Eco Council.

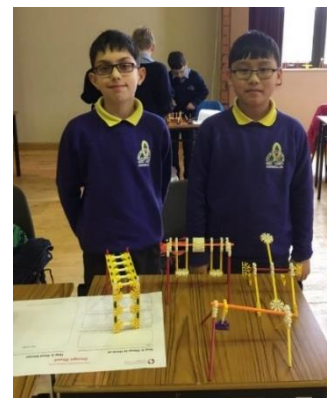
Congratulations to Cora McGlone, Eirinn Murphy, Shane Maguire & Luca Treacy whose

The Nursery classes visited Enniskillen Library in February. The children had a great time singing songs, reading stories and colouring pictures. They were all really impressed by the great selection of wonderful books to choose from.



P3 overview of planned work - March

Mathematics:

Depending on group children will:

- Continue to work on place value of 2 and 3 digit numbers, be able to partition numbers into H.T.U. and T.U. and add and subtract T.U. with and without bridging the ten.
- Children will begin to work with sets/groups of numbers to introduce the concept of multiplication – they will be able to round numbers off to the nearest 10/100 -Focus will also be on solving simple word problems set in real life situations. Children will continue to use 100 grids to find patterns to add and subtract.
- All groups are working on their addition and subtraction tables to develop quick recall of number bonds and we would encourage parents to make sure that they spend time every night on them.

Topic Work

Topic for this month is volume and capacity. Children will know the language associated with capacity. They will be able to make estimates using non arbitrary and standard units of measurement. Parents are asked to support children at home or when shopping, pointing out units of measurement on the packages of everyday household items.

Literacy

Grammar focus will continue to be on adjectives and this month children will become familiar with the rules for adding 'ing' to verbs. We will use some traditional fairy tales to explore the narrative writing genre.

The World Around Us

This month's theme will primarily be 'Electricity', we will also look at a range of great science explorers. Other topics this month will be Mother's Day and Saint Patricks Day.

Other Information

- As part of our fairy tale theme all classes will visit Enniskillen Museum to explore life in a medieval castle and discover how people lived, what food they ate, how they spent their leisure time and how they defended their castle. We will also be visiting Enniskillen town library this month. Additional information on these trips will follow.
- **Museum trip dates: 20th, 21st, or 22nd March.** More information to follow.

P4 overview of planned work - March

Literacy- Pupils will continue to learn their spellings using the LSCWC method and will complete various activities to reinforce the spelling rules. Pupils will be reading their class novel, *'The Egyptian Cinderella'*. In grammar, pupils will look at direct speech linked to their novel. They will be writing a non-chronological report on King Tutankhamun.

Numeracy- Pupils will be learning about subtraction and will be solving word problems. They will continue to learn multiplication facts. Our topic work this month will cover 3D shape, children will be learning the names and properties of 3D shapes. We will be looking at the language of direction including left, right and the compass points. Pupils will also use ISAK9 and complete problem solving investigations.

World Around Us- This month we will be concluding our topic of Ancient Egypt. Pupils will learn about the pyramids and the gods that were worshipped in Ancient Egypt. They will investigate and research inventions and achievements of the Egyptians.

P5 overview of planned work - March

Numeracy

Number: Fractions (halves, quarters, tenths, thirds and fifths). Finding fraction of an amount. Equivalent fractions e.g $\frac{1}{2} = \frac{2}{4}$. **Topic:** Capacity – using litres and millilitres. Discuss how to find volume

Mental Maths – Multiplication tables and division tables.

Weekly tables test and mental maths test preparation

Parents – Could you help children become aware of and read measurements on everyday containers – e.g milk, cartons, bottles, sugar, boxes? Children could use sugar cubes to build structures and discuss the volume.

Literacy

Novel: Finish 'Kaspar Prince of Cats Novel' and activities to match.

Grammar work: Revision of apostrophes, prepositions (telling where something is) and conjunctions (joining sentences).

Writing: Narrative (story) writing, looking at settings, plots, characters and being able to plan, write and edit a story. We will complete spelling list 20–23 from 'Schofield and Sims' Spelling Programme and matching activities from workbook. Weekly spelling test preparation.

World Around Us

Topic work - Finish work on Titanic topic (survivors and wreckage, states of water and experiments linked to water)
Start work on Water topic – Uses of water, saving water in school and home, Water Cycle and language associated with water

Other Information – Work, Trips, Visits etc

- Homework diary signed and homework completed every night (Take away Homework to be handed in on Thursday of each week).
- Highlight important information and signs in Mental Arithmetic
- 10 minutes Doodle Maths and AR every night (2 quizzes per week)
- Musical Instruments to be brought into school every Wednesday.
Please encourage children to practise instruments at home and follow the 'Charanga' programme (lessons continued from school)

P6 overview of planned work - March

Maths: The pupils will be able to use division/multiplication in simple problem solving. They will understand that division is linked with fractions. Pupils will use fractions in context and understand the terms proper and improper fractions. They will use fractions to describe quantities. E.g. 5/8 of a class are girls what fraction are boys? Pupils will understand equivalent fractions.

Topic: Pupils will collect, record, and interpret various data from a variety of charts and diagrams. They will be able to read and interpret information from tables, pictograms, diagrams, lists, bar charts, simple pie charts and data bases. Pupils will have the opportunity to respond to graphs interactively through ICT programs and complete related follow up activities.

English: Pupils will understand antonyms (opposites) and be able to understand the purpose of prefixes in the context of opposites. E.g. honest/dishonest. They will know what plurals are and the rules for making words plural.

GENRE: Report writing continued/Procedural writing

Pupils will continue with their Irish News critical literacy project and be able to write their own news report.

Pupils will be able to follow instructions given in a variety of texts and be able to write their own instructions for an activity. (Making a 3D Long ship)

World Around Us

The pupils will continue with 'The Vikings' topic and find out about building a Viking Ship, Viking Raids, Viking homes and evidence of Viking settlements today.

Homework

We encourage the P6s to keep doing AR reading and Doodle Maths which is part of their daily homework.

Each pupil should be taking **at least** one AR test per week (more if on green and orange level) and working towards their word count target for the term. Takeaway homework will continue for P6.

- **AR Books** can be changed in the library between 8.30 and 8.50.
- **ICT suite** is also available at these times to complete AR tests.

P7 overview of planned work - March

Literacy: Myths and Legends – Read wide range of myths, legends, fables and traditional stories. Plan and write a new version of a myth, legend. **Novel work** – 'Twelfth Day of July' and related activities.

The P7 classes will all visit the town library this month.

Numeracy: Number work – Fractions and Decimals. Topic work – Time.

Children should be working on Doodle Maths at home every night.

World Around Us: Northern Ireland/Ireland Topic. Landmark Models that children produced for 'Take Away' homework will be on display in the Enniskillen Museum from Wednesday 6th March.

Religion: Confirmation Preparation - Children need to bring in a photo of their Baptism, a photo of their Holy Communion Day and a photo of their sponsor. These are going to be stuck into their Confirmation Book. Please place in an envelope and put your child's name on the front.

Keeping your child safe online

Please make every effort to keep your child safe online. You may find this guide helpful when setting up devices for children.

Consider the following questions (taken from a fact sheet by the Royal College of Paediatrics and Children's Health)

- Is screen time in your household controlled?
